This will bring together all they've learned over the course, and help them to remember things they may have forgotten by working with other students and seeing their work.

Your child could talk to you at home about what their group did, how well it went, what other groups did, what they've learned...

Finally... they will be asked to complete an evaluation, asking about what they've learned about drugs, what was most and least useful, and whether there is anything else they would have liked to have been included in the lessons.

#### Who are they?

A national charity working on a variety of projects across the UK to protect children and young people from alcohol and drug harm, including developing training and resources for schools, mentoring support to young people, academic research and informing policy.

#### What's on their website for parents/carers?

Information and advice on drugs and alcohol, including by age range; short videos answering commonly asked questions; links to other information for parents/carers available online.

#### Adfam (www.adfam.org.uk)



#### Who are they?

A national organisation working with and for families affected by drugs and alcohol. They offer support to families and are also an umbrella organisation for smaller local support groups. Adfam also works closely with government and other bodies to ensure that families are kept on the agenda in wider discussion of 'the drug problem'.

#### What's on their website for parents/carers?

Information and support for families, including signs to look for and where to look for help; drug factfile; information about local support groups; publications for families.

A national charity offering support to families affected by addiction to drugs or alcohol, through counselling and befriending, support groups, bereavement support, education and awareness raising.
